EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

HISTORY

It is no surprise young adults in the United States shy away from voting precincts on election day. Whether apathy, lack of understanding of the elections process, or even belief one vote doesn't matter, the youngest generation of voters in the U.S. is one of the lowest performing groups in the country and across the globe¹. According to a U.S. Census Bureau² publication distributed after the 2022 federal election, voters aged 18-29 (of the citizen voting-age population) have been underrepresented in every congressional election on record, with 2018 marking the highest turnout in this category. Mississippi also marked the country's lowest turnout among voters with a bachelor's degree or higher.

Not only does Mississippi have a difficult time engaging citizens in voting, specifically young adults, but also retaining educated, young professionals. According to research conducted by the Mississippi State Economist Corey Miller, "College and high school graduates make up smaller proportions of the population in Mississippi than in almost all other states³."

Further, when comparing the number of individuals aged 25 and older with at least a bachelor's degree who moved away from the state to those who moved into the state from 2010 to 2019, the difference is negative in eight of the 10 years. During this period, only two other southern states experienced such loss. Arkansas recorded one negative year in 2019, and Louisiana experienced three negative years in 2017, 2018, and 2019.

While numerous other publications support these alarming statistics, the message is clear-- Mississippi needs to engage our young leaders and voters.

After a chance meeting with all officers of the 2021 ALA Magnolia Girls State, Secretary Michael Watson decided to launch a program aimed at engaging high school seniors with one of the focuses being the elections and voter registration process in our state. In the spring of 2022, the Secretary of State's Office launched its first application for the inaugural class of SOS Student Ambassadors to participate during the 2022-2023 school year.

SIGNIFICANCE

The SOS Student Ambassador program, comprised of Mississippi's best and brightest young leaders, is a unique opportunity where students with a passion for leadership and state government are equipped to return to their schools as proponents of voter education and civic awareness. Through regular interactions with Secretary Watson, other leaders from the Mississippi Secretary of State's Office, state and local officials, and business and industry leaders, students who complete the program receive a first-hand account of state government in action, establish a network of like-minded peers from across the state, and experience the processes which ensure Mississippi is a better place for generations to come.

Utilizing thoughtfully scheduled and coordinated programming, students are mentored by leaders of all sectors in hopes of not only encouraging them to engage in the civics process but also investing and residing in their home state.

Any Mississippi student who meets the following criteria may submit an application for consideration:

Grade Point Average of 3.0 or above

- Upcoming high school senior
- Proven satisfactory behavioral conduct
- Strong interest in state government and service

During the spring semester, the online application is released and requires completion of the following:

- Basic personal information
- Activities and awards within the school and community
- School counselor or administrator reference
- Personal reference
- Letter of recommendation
- 300-600 word essay

Once the application deadline has passed, all applications are reviewed by members of the Secretary of State's Office. Students with exceptional academic and service activities are selected to participate during the upcoming school year.

Components of the program include:

- A fall summit in Jackson (state capital) focused on the state's elections process and the Secretary
 of State's official functions.
- A spring summit in Jackson focused on the state's legislative process and voter registration drives.
- One to two regional summits on various Mississippi university campuses to highlight educational opportunities within the state.
- Monthly webinars with Secretary Watson and other Mississippi leaders. Each session gives the speaker an opportunity to tell his or her story and concludes with a question/answer period for the students.

IMPACTS/RESULTS

Since the program's inception, 193 students representing 121 high schools across all four congressional districts have participated. The 2024-2025 class is the largest to date—a 25% increase from the inaugural year.

Not only has our office assembled students to learn, but we have also empowered them to use the information accumulated to host voter registration drives in their respective schools and communities. Each student, utilizing information obtained via meetings and our office's Voter Registration Toolkit, has autonomously planned and conducted a voter registration drive for their peers.

→ "Getting to hold a voter registration drive at my school was a wonderful experience; I was able to register one-fourth of my graduating class.
